WIRELESS TELEGRAPHY TO BE STUDIED HERE

Apparatus to Be One of the Best in the State---
Designed to Cover Distance of 500 Miles

If the Iowa engineers want to discuss the weather or other subjects with their friends out at Ames, they will be able to do it pretty soon—do it by wireless too. The only thing about it, Iowa will be able to talk to Ames and Ames can hear it—but Ames can't talk back. Which will be not without advantages.

The electrical engineering department of the university is shortly to install a complete wireless set, costing in the neighborhood of \$500. A most thirty-five feet high will be put up on the north end of the physics building and a network of wires stretched from it to the flag staff on the dome of the Old Capitol. This will serve as an aerial, and the apparatus will have a range of some three or four hundred miles.

It will be one of the largest in the state, possibly the largest. It will be able to communicate with the Rock Island arsenal station over the Mississippi river, and there are a number of private stations in the state with which it can talk. The Ames set will be able to receive the signals from Iowa, the same as most low powered stations, but its transmitting apparatus is small and unable to send messages this far. Hence the reason for their hearing to all we say and not talking back.

However, the apparatus wasn't purchased for the purpose of discussing football certainties with Ames, or kindred subjects. It is intended for experimenting and will give the boys much practice in a new and rapidly developing field of engineering. The university already possessed a set that will send five or ten miles.

This purchase is only a part of a sum of \$1200 that has been spent on further apparatus for the electrical laboratory. New lecture apparatus, transformers, bigger motors, and a new type of rotary converter, have been ordered within the last six weeks. A \$1000 oscillograph for recording the wave forms of alternating currents is likewise an important addition.

The university, since the electrical department was moved to the physics building, has had one of the most modern and thoroughly equipped laboratories in this branch of work to be found in the country. With the addition of so many thousands of dollars worth of new equipment this year much advanced and constructive work can be undertaken.

CLUB WOMEN WILL VISIT UNIVERSITY

Decision Reached At Meeting at Des Moines to Come Here for Next Convention

Iowa City and the university will entertain the federation of women's clubs of the state here for the 1915 convention. President Bowman extended a personal invitation to the women to meet at the university city and a telegram from the executive council yesterday afternoon said that the choice had been unanimous.

The women of the state ought to see the university, is the opinion of the university authorities. They believe it will lead to a large advance in the registration of the department of domestic science and the college of Fine Arts especially.

TALKS TO WOMEN

STRENUOUS PRACTICE ON MUDDY FIELD

REAL SCRIMMAGE STAGED BY HAWLEY—YEARLINGS FACED VARSITY IN WORK

Special Attention Paid to the Line Men—Work of Men on Field Yesterday Highly Satisfactory to Coaches.

Daunted not a whit by lowering clouds and soggy underfooting, Coach Hawley's Hawkeyes engaged in the most strenuous practice of the present, still young, season. A large share of the afternoon was devoted to what might be said to be the first taste of real scrimmage experienced by the team candidates this year. Coach Thomas' yearlings were called upon for the first time to begin their active work in preparing and conditioning the first string athletes for the coming games. From present indications the youngsters will force the varsity to the limit on more than one occasion this season.

Special attention was paid to the linemen in yesterday's mix, work in blocking, tackling, etc., being emphasized. Iowa's line will have no sieve-like qualities if the work shown by the men in yesterday's practice is any criterion of their ability to oppose the savage on-rushes of speedy backs.

DENTAL COLLEGE IS MAKING BIG STRIDES

DEAN McCLERON WITNESSES FIFTY PERCENT INCREASE IN COLLEGE

Because of Men From Drake Senior Class Shows Largest Increase—Iowa Has Highest and Most Exact Requirements.

With the coming of Dr. Thomas J. McCleron, the new dean, and an increase of nearly fifty per cent in the enrollment, the college of dentistry is beginning an unusually prosperous year. The registration has reached the figure of 230, of which number 116 are freshmen.

The enrollment last year, the registration for this year and the per cent of increase are shown in the following table:

It is seen that the senior class shows by far the greatest per cent of increase. While this is due partly to the accession from Drake university, of the increase of thirty-seven students in the two upper classes of only about one-half come from Des Moines.

"Many applications to enter the college were received which I was compelled to turn down," said Dean McClernon yesterday. These came from students who did not meet our requirements for admission or who had attended colleges whose entrance standards were lower than ours."

The Iowa university college is a member of an association of dental schools in the United States having the highest and most exacting entrance requirements. Credits from these schools are accepted in any part of the world where American college credits are recognized at all.
